As such, we are delighted to present this 2021 Autumn Issue as a collection of two thought-provoking commentaries and an opinion piece on three cutting-edge issues within the transnational legal field.

In our first contribution, Tina van der Linden critically reflects on the European Commission's 2021 proposal for the Regulation of Artificial Intelligence, published in extension of its 2019 'Guidelines on Trustworthy AI'. While welcoming the European legislator's efforts to acknowledge the potential risks to society that emanate from the use of AI, the author fundamentally challenges the Commission's bureaucratic approach and advocates for the application and enforcement of existing regulations.

The second contribution, authored by Alessia Nicastro, focuses on the European Court of Human Rights' *Talpis v. Italy* case on domestic violence. Preceded by an analysis of the cases' legal framework and jurisprudential significance, the author reflects on the lack of action by the Italian authorities and their failure to adequately respond to and prevent cases of domestic violence. Moreover, the author touches upon the internationalisation of national cases on domestic violence.

In the third and final contribution to this issue, Ciara Murphy assesses the effectiveness of the United Nations Human Rights Council on the basis of its review mechanism for member-states' human rights records - the Universal Periodic Review (UPR). Predicated on the assumption that the "UPR is only as effective as the Member States allow it to be in their engagement, trust, and cooperation", Murphy probes into the factors influencing the Council's relationship with Asia and Africa and the factors hampering its collaboration with China and South Africa, specifically.

On behalf of the whole editorial team, we would like to thank all authors for their contribution to this issue.
